Ouiz Format

To ensure a fair competition, **the same topics** will be set for Years 8-12 Second Language Learners and Years 8-12 Background Language Learners (Chinese Second Language Learners with a cultural or linguistic background in Chinese), but **with different levels of difficulty**. This allows each language pathway to showcase their abilities. Therefore, we kindly request teachers to register their students under the correct learner pathway.

The quiz will include **a combination of paper and pen questions as well as online questions**, with both individual and collaborative components. A detailed program for the evening will be provided to participants closer to the event date.

Individual Challenge

Part 1

Chinese Knowledge Written Test (15 minutes)

Competition Mode: Each student is given a set of competition questions and an answer sheet to complete the written test within the specified 15 minutes. The questions and answer sheets will be collected and manually graded by the teacher at the end of the allotted time.

The competition questions in Part 1 are divided into four groups of different difficulty levels to ensure fair competition for second language and background language students in both middle and senior years. Therefore, teachers are requested to strictly classify student registrations according to their actual language backgrounds.

Part 2

Cultural Knowledge Quiz (20 minutes)

Competition Mode: Each student needs to bring a mobile phone or computer to participate in the Kahoot quiz. The scores will be automatically calculated in the Kahoot backend.

The quiz questions in this part only cover cultural knowledge and do not involve language skills, so there are no subgroups for the competition questions.

The highest score in the individual challenge will be awarded to the participating student with the highest total score in Part 1 and Part 2 of the competition questions. The gold, silver, and bronze awards for the individual challenge, as well as various individual awards, will be announced on the same evening.

Team Challenge

Part 3

Comprehensive Knowledge Competition (30 minutes)

Competition Mode: This is a comprehensive knowledge competition conducted in school teams. Each team consists of a mix of second language students, background language students, junior high school students, and high school students, with 2-4 members per team. Each team is allowed to use a mobile phone or computer to participate in the on-site buzzer quiz.

The team with the highest score will be awarded the first place in the team challenge, followed by the second and third place team awards.

2023 SA CHINESE LANGUAGE VIDEO COMPETITION

RATIONALE

Are you passionate about learning Chinese and creating videos? Then you won't want to miss the opportunity to participate in our 2023 Chinese Language Video Competition for students.

This competition provides you with a chance to showcase your Chinese language skills and unleash your creativity by producing a short video in Chinese. Show us your interpretation of Chinese culture, whether through music, dance, food, or other art forms, by creating a short video. The competition is open to all students currently learning Chinese, regardless of your proficiency level.

THEME AND TOPIC

In 2023, we challenge all students to incorporate this year's signature phrase, '未来', into their video to showcase their Chinese language skills and creativity.

The video can explore any topic, and while the signature phrase does not have to be the central theme, it must be featured somewhere in the production. We encourage students to explore any style or theme that interests them, including music videos, comedies, dramas, role-plays, documentaries, animations, and claymation, as long as it includes the use of the Chinese language and the signature phrase. So, let your imagination run wild and create a video that you will be proud to share with others!

CATEGORIES

The competition has three categories, each assessed separately based on the following criteria:

- Category One: Chinese Second Language Learner
 For non-native learners studying Chinese as a second language.
- Category Two: Background Language Learner

 For students who may speak Mandarin at home or have some background knowledge in the language but are not necessarily native speakers.
- Category Three: First Language Learners of Chinese
 For native Chinese language learners who have had more than one year of schooling in Mandarin in a country or area where Mandarin is spoken.

GROUPS

The South Australian public, independent, and Catholic schools may submit up to four entries per competition category in each of the following groups:

- Junior Primary Group: Reception to Year 2
- Upper Primary Group: Year 3 to Year 6
- Middle Group: Year 7 to Year 9
- Senior Group: Year 10 to Year 12

Officially registered community schools may submit up to two entries per competition category in each of the following groups:

- Primary Year Group: Reception to Year 6
- Middle Year Group: Year 7 to Year 12

ELIGIBILITY

Students who are learning the Chinese language in South Australian public, independent, Catholic schools, or officially registered community schools are eligible to enter.

SCHOOL ENTRY FEE

- \$10 per video entry (student of CLTASA member teachers);
- \$20 per video entry (student of non-CLTASA member teachers)



2023 SA CHINESE LANGUAGE VIDEO COMPETITION

VIDEO FORMAT

- Entries must be original videos or films produced by students.
- The video must be between 1.5-3 minutes in length and include dialogue or narration in Chinese spoken by the participating students themselves.
- Each entry must include a cover page specifying the school name, group, category, and student names, as well as the video title.
- Entries must be submitted in MP4 or MOV format and meet technical requirements for resolution and sound quality.
- Participating students must appear in the video when speaking Chinese.
- Entries should be appropriate for all ages and must not contain explicit or offensive material.

CONTESTANTS

- Students can participate in the competition either as an individual or as part of a group, with up to four students allowed per group in the same category. It's essential that each participating student plays a significant role in the production process.
- Please note that group work cannot include students from different categories. For example, a First Language student cannot collaborate with a Background Language Learner.
- Community Schools can only compete with other Community Schools.
- Furthermore, it's important to note that students cannot be nominated twice. For instance, if a student is nominated in a community school, they cannot be nominated in a mainstream school as well.

VIDEO UPLOADING AND SHARING

Any link from Google Drive, OneDrive, a private YouTube link, or other online platforms can be used for uploading videos, as long as the link can be shared with the CLTASA committee to download the videos.

VIDEO SUBMISSION

Registration for the competition opens on Monday 1st May 2023 (Term 2), and the deadline for video submission is **Friday 1st September 2023 (Term 3)**. Please note that late submissions may not be considered.

For this competition, we encourage school teachers to register and provide information for all students from their respective schools in a unified manner. However, if it is inconvenient for teachers to register students collectively, we encourage students and parents to register on their own (if the student is a minor, parents can fill out the registration form on their behalf). In the event of a conflict between the number of videos registered by self-registered students and the maximum number of videos allowed for teacher registration at your school, priority will be given to the teacher's registration.

STUDENT NOMINATION

NOMINATION CRITERIA

Each school can nominate ONE primary and ONE secondary student who demonstrates high enthusiasm for Chinese studies and outstanding knowledge and understanding of Chinese culture. This includes but is not limited to knowledge of Chinese history, literature, art, and traditions. Students cannot be nominated twice. For example, if a student is nominated in a community school, they cannot be nominated in mainstream schools as well.

CATEGORIES

The Chinese Language Awards offers three categories for student nomination:

- Second Language Learners of Chinese: The student must be a non-native learner studying Chinese as a second language and has Chinese language skills but is not necessarily the top academic student.
- **Background Language Learners of Chinese**: The student may speak Mandarin at home, not necessarily exclusively, and have varying degrees of knowledge of and proficiency in the language being learned.
- **First Language Learners of Chinese**: The student is a native Chinese language learner who has had more than one year's schooling in Mandarin in a country or area where Mandarin is spoken.

PRIZES

The Chinese Language Awards offers the following prizes:

- Junior School students: \$30 Gift Card and Certificate of Excellence
- Secondary School students: \$50 Gift Card and Certificate of Excellence

Awards will be presented to nominated students who meet the criteria for each category.

SCHOOL ENTRY FEE

The school entry fee for the Chinese Language Awards is as follows:

- \$30 per nominee for students of CLTASA member teachers
- \$60 per nominee for students of non-CLTASA member teachers

AWARDS NOMINATION PROCESS

Student nominations open on Saturday, July 1st, 2023 (Term 2), and the deadline for nomination is **Friday**, **September 15th**, **2023 (Term 3)**.

2023 CLTASA SUB-COMMITTEE

In 2023, the Committee of CLTASA plans to establish a sub-committee based on the existing committee as discussed during the Committee Meeting on 30th January 2023. The decision was made based on the CLTASA Constitution published in 2021 by the formal CLTASA Committee (please view the detailed CLTASA Constitution on the CLTASA Website https://www.cltasa.org). The Constitution allows the committee to appoint sub-committees for any purpose.

The purpose of the sub-committee is to achieve the following:

Firstly, to involve more teachers in the association's affairs and decision-making process. Until this year, many teachers were not familiar with the association's operations and did not have the opportunity to participate in many of the decision-making processes. The formation of the sub-committee will enable more people to participate in the association's decision-making and design future activities.

Secondly, to establish relationships with more schools and increase the association's membership. Currently, the committee comprises members from nine schools, and the sub-committee aims to attract teachers from other schools to join the association. This will help to promote student activities, and teacher training, and expand the association's reach.

Thirdly, establishing a sub-committee is also helpful for communication and exchange with experienced teachers. In the past few years, the composition of the association members has undergone significant changes, many experienced, knowledgeable, and visionary teachers have not joined the association; while the composition of the past association committee members has remained unchanged. This has also led to the gradual disappearance of valuable teaching experience and the historical heritage of the association. We also hope that through the establishment of a sub-committee of CLTASA within the association committee, we can once again gather more experienced teachers to work together in collaboration.

Meanwhile, to cultivate young talent for the association's future needs. While the association has achieved significant success under the leadership of the older generation of teachers over the last two decades, it needs to continue to evolve by nurturing a new generation of teachers who not only have professional knowledge but also possess an innovative spirit to adapt to the changing times. The subcommittee's main task is to provide development opportunities for young talent, guide them to become leaders in the community of Chinese language teachers, and encourage them to take responsibility. These sub-committee members will also be one of the priority groups for future committee selection.

Finally, new sub-committee members will be a great help to the current committee. Since October 2022, the current committee members have voluntarily participated in the committee's work while teaching full-time at schools. In this era where everyone is racing against time, this will invisibly make committee members face the difficulty of balancing school, family, and association affairs. Based on the past five months' experience, recruiting more sub-committee members can help the current committee share existing tasks, assist in organizing activities, and apply their new ideas and technological expertise to the operation of the committee, thereby improving the association's work efficiency.

Our only requirement for our committee and sub-committee members is that we have a passion for education and actively participate in all association affairs. Therefore, the association sincerely invites likeminded teachers, pre-service, and volunteers to join the CLTASA sub-committee in 2023. We understand that joining the committee or sub-committee means sacrificing personal time to undertake the association's responsibilities and share tasks voluntarily. We appreciate the contributions of all committee and sub-committee members to the association's development and look forward to working with all of us to create a better future for the association.



INTRODUCTION

The teaching of Chinese as a foreign language has become increasingly important with the growth of China's global economic and cultural influence. However, finding qualified and experienced Chinese language teachers can be a challenge, particularly in areas with smaller populations.

The Bridge to Excellence project aims to connect Chinese language teachers, who are members of the CLTASA or the CLTANT, and create opportunities for our teachers to learn from and support one another. By doing so, we hope to enhance the quality of Chinese language education in both urban and country areas in two states.

OBJECTIVES

General Objectives

- To provide Chinese language teachers with opportunities to observe each other's lessons online or in person, discuss best practices, and provide feedback to each other.
- To build a community of Chinese language teachers across South Australia and Northern Territory states who can collaborate and share resources to enhance the quality of Chinese language education.
- To improve student outcomes in Chinese language education by supporting the professional development of Chinese language teachers.

Specific Objectives

- To enhance Chinese language teachers' pedagogical skills to create engaging learning environments for students.
- To provide opportunities for teachers to share and exchange teaching ideas and strategies.
- To improve Chinese language teaching methods and practices.
- To support Chinese language teachers with tools and resources to deliver innovative teaching approaches that align with the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) standards.
- To evaluate the effectiveness of the Bridge to Excellence project and its impact on teachers and students.

BENEFITS

- Professional Development: By observing each other's lessons, discussing best practices, and providing feedback, Chinese language teachers can learn from one another and enhance their teaching skills and knowledge.
- Increased Collaboration: This project can foster collaboration and networking among Chinese language teachers across different states, building a community of professionals who can share resources and support each other.
- Improved Student Outcomes: By enhancing the quality of Chinese language education through teacher professional development and collaboration, students can benefit from innovative teaching practices and increased teacher proficiency, which may lead to improved student outcomes.

PROJECT GROUPS

The Bridge to Excellence project will be divided into three project groups based on the language proficiency level of the students and the teaching needs of the teachers in the Northern Territory and South Australia metropolitan and regional areas. Teachers can participate in any of the three groups as needed.

- **The Beginner Group** is for teachers who are teaching students with limited or no previous experience in learning Chinese.
- **The Intermediate Group** is for teachers who are teaching students with intermediate proficiency levels in Chinese.
- **The Advanced Group** is for teachers who are teaching students with advanced proficiency levels in Chinese.

PROJECT PHASES

The Bridge to Excellence project will be conducted in four phases:

Phase 1: Planning and Preparation (March-April): The planning phase will involve project coordination, recruitment of participants, and the development of program materials and establishing communication channels among participating teachers.

Phase 2: Professional Development and Instructional Coaching (May-October): The professional development phase will involve termly professional development sessions, online resources, instructional coaching, cross-classroom observations in person or online, and engaging in discussions to share best practices.

Phase 3: Conference Presentation (September): The conference phase will involve a state conference where teachers can share their project experiences and outcomes with a wider audience.

Phase 4: Reporting (November-December): The reporting phase will involve the submission of a project report that highlights the project's goals, outcomes, and recommendations for future improvements. The report will share the project experiences and outcomes with a wider audience.

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

The following activities will be implemented throughout the project:

- Termly face-to-face and online professional development sessions that provide opportunities for Chinese language teachers to learn from one another and enhance their teaching skills.
- Online resources that support Chinese language teachers in their teaching practices and provide access to instructional materials and best practices.
- Instructional coaching that provides one-on-one support to Chinese language teachers in implementing new teaching strategies and techniques.
- Cross-classroom observations and discussions among participants to promote learning and collaboration.
- Participation in a state conference where teachers can share their project experiences and outcomes with a wider audience.
- Submission of a project report that highlights the project's goals, outcomes, and recommendations for future improvements.

EVALUATION AND FEEDBACK PROCESS

The project's success will be evaluated through a combination of quantitative and qualitative methods. Quantitative data such as student performance data, teacher participation rates, and survey data will be collected to assess the project's impact on student outcomes and teacher engagement.

Qualitative data will be collected through teacher feedback and self-reflection, as well as observations of classroom instruction. This data will be used to assess the quality of the project's activities and their impact on teacher professional development.

BUDGET (\$4,000)

The Bridge to Excellence project is funded by the CLTASA and CLTANT. The project's budget is broken down as follows:

- Professional development workshops and instructional coaching: \$900
- Online resources and platform development: \$900
- Cross-classroom observations and discussions: \$900
- State conference participation: \$N/A
- Evaluation and assessment: \$300
- Project management and administration: \$500
- Contingency fund: \$500

PROJECT PARTICIPANTS

This program is specifically designed for Chinese language teachers who are currently teaching in a Chinese language class. Prospective Chinese language teachers are also welcome to participate in the project as observers. This will provide them with an opportunity to observe practical teaching methods and engage in professional discussions to prepare for their future careers.

To participate in the program, teachers must demonstrate a genuine interest in learning and implementing the teaching methods and resources recommended by the project team during classroom discussions. They should also be willing to observe other teachers' classes either in-person or online during their regular teaching practice.

Furthermore, schools are required to support participating teachers by allowing them to attend teaching discussions and observation sessions. They should also provide Teaching Relief Time (TRT) and permit the use of classroom teaching activities, images, and materials in the project report.

Participating teachers are expected to present their project experiences as a workshop during the South Australian Chinese Language Teachers' Conference in Semester 2, 2023. By the end of Term 4, the group is expected to submit a collective project report. Teachers are required to provide self-reflection and feedback on the project, as well as attach materials that demonstrate their teaching and student interaction.

CONCLUSION

The Bridge to Excellence project connects Chinese language teachers in South Australia and the Northern Territory to enhance Chinese language education. Through cross-classroom observations, professional development, and participation in a state conference, teachers collaborate to improve student outcomes. The project is evaluated with both quantitative and qualitative methods, and a final report summarizes achievements and recommendations for future improvements. This program offers a platform for teachers to learn, share experiences, and promote innovative and effective teaching methods in the Chinese language classroom, ultimately benefiting their students

Practical Teaching and Research Activities for Chinese Language Teachers

The composition of the project plan will be carried out in 2023 to Term 1 2024.

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Rationale

Based on the feedback received from Chinese teachers at the end of 2022 and early 2023, the Chinese teaching team in South Australia is facing several major challenges:

Firstly, there is a lack of practical research and teaching activities, especially for early career teachers who have limited opportunities to observe classroom teaching firsthand, resulting in a slow improvement in their teaching skills.

Secondly, due to a lack of professional development budget, Chinese teachers, particularly those in rural areas, are unable to participate in sufficient research and training activities.

Thirdly, there is a lack of research activities focused on the curriculum, particularly on AC9.0, leading to doubts and anxieties among teachers about implementing the new syllabus.

Project Objectives

To address the above challenges, the CLTASA plans to implement the following activities included in the Bridging the Gap project to better support the needs of rural teachers, early career teachers, and all teachers:

AC9.0 Research and Resource Library Program

Three-term AC9.0 research is organized to work with Chinese teachers to analyze and discuss the effective use of resources. Through discussions on AC9.0-based teaching plans and the development of a practical resource library, we aim to share online materials, classroom resources, unit plans, differentiated activity designs, and task settings suitable for different year levels. The goal is to provide practical resources and save teachers time in creating similar resources.

Class Observation Activities

Organize Chinese teachers to visit and observe Chinese classes in other schools. Through mutual learning and sharing, facilitate exchange and improvement among teachers. Additionally, provide early career teachers with the opportunity to observe advanced teaching practices of experienced teachers, helping them develop into competent educators. By participating in both online and offline class observation activities, promote communication and collaboration among urban and rural teachers, as well as between early career and experienced teachers.

Project Benefits

By participating in research and

Benefits for Early Career Teachers

- Participation in AC 9.0 research activities enables Early Career teachers to understand the latest curriculum requirements and teaching methods, better applying them in their own teaching practices.
- Through class observation activities, Early Career teachers can observe advanced teaching experiences of experienced teachers, facilitating their rapid growth into competent teachers.

 By participating in research and professional development, teachers from country can compensate for the lack of professional development opportunities due to limited training budgets, thereby improving their teaching abilities.

Benefits for Country Teachers

 Engaging in class observation activities allows country teachers to engage in discussions with urban teachers, promoting exchange and collaboration between urban and country teachers, and enriching their teaching experiences.

Benefits for All Teachers (including Pre-service Teachers)

- AC 9.0 research activities will help all Chinese teachers understand the new syllabus requirements and provide practical teaching plans and resource libraries, saving teachers time and effort.
- Class observation activities provide teachers with opportunities for observation and learning, facilitating professional growth and improvement through the adoption of others' teaching experiences.
- Through these project activities, Chinese teachers will gain practical teaching experiences and teaching resources, enhancing the quality and effectiveness of their teaching, further meeting the students' needs in Chinese language learning, and advancing teachers' professional development and satisfaction.

Project Activities

Cross-classroom observations and discussions (4 sessions)

Organize opportunities for teachers to observe each other's classes and engage in discussions afterward. This can foster a culture of learning and collaboration among teachers. By observing and reflecting on different teaching approaches, teachers can gain insights, exchange ideas, and learn from each other's experiences.

Monthly discussions and development on AC 9.0 (4 sessions)

Regular meetings can be held to discuss the requirements and updates of the AC 9.0. Teachers can collaboratively analyze the curriculum, share insights and best practices, and explore effective teaching approaches aligned with the curriculum.

Resource Library for teaching support (long term-goal)

Develop an online platform and resource library specifically tailored to Chinese language teachers. This platform can provide access to instructional materials, lesson plans, teaching resources, and examples of best practices. Teachers can utilize these resources to enhance their teaching practices and save time in creating their own materials.

Face-to-face and online professional development (2 sessions in Term 3 and 4 2023)

Due to budget limitations, the CLTASA currently does not have professional development scheduled for Term 3 and Term 4. However, if the project application is successful, professional development sessions can be conducted for all teachers to facilitate knowledge sharing and skill enhancement among Chinese language teachers. These sessions will be based on the project discussions and research conducted each term. The topics covered may include effective teaching strategies, assessment methods, integrating technology in the classroom, and addressing specific challenges faced by teachers.

Instructional coaching

Offer one-on-one support and coaching to Chinese language teachers. Experienced mentors can work closely with individual teachers, especially country teachers and Early Career teachers, to provide guidance, feedback, and support in implementing new teaching strategies and techniques. This personalized approach can help teachers refine their instructional methods and address specific areas for improvement.

Participation in the State or National Conference

Project teachers can present their experiences, outcomes, and successful practices to a wider audience. This will allow teachers to showcase their achievements, receive feedback, and learn from other professionals in the field.

Project Report Submission

At the conclusion of the project, require participants to participate in the final report writing by sharing the project's goals, outcomes, challenges faced, successful strategies, and recommendations for future improvements. This report can serve as a valuable resource for other teachers and educational stakeholders interested in similar initiatives.

Evaluation and Feedback Process

To ensure a comprehensive evaluation of the project's success, a robust evaluation and feedback process will be implemented. This process will incorporate both quantitative and qualitative methods to gather data and assess the project's effectiveness.

Quantitative Data Collection

Quantitative data will be collected to measure the project's impact on student outcomes and teacher engagement. This data may include student performance data, such as preand post-project assessments, to evaluate any improvements in language proficiency. Additionally, data on teacher participation rates and engagement in project activities will be collected to gauge the level of involvement and commitment.

Surveys and Questionnaires

Surveys and questionnaires will be administered to both teachers and students to gather feedback on the project's activities, resources, and overall effectiveness. These surveys can cover topics such as teacher satisfaction, perceived improvements in teaching practices, student engagement, and the usefulness of the provided resources. The feedback collected will provide valuable insights into the project's impact and areas for improvement.

Qualitative Data Collection

Qualitative data will be collected through various means to gain deeper insights into the project's outcomes. This can include teacher feedback sessions, focus group discussions, and reflective practices. Teachers will have the opportunity to share their experiences, challenges faced, and the benefits they have derived from participating in the project. Classroom observations and lesson evaluations can also provide qualitative data on the implementation of new teaching strategies and techniques.

Data Analysis and Reporting

The collected quantitative and qualitative data will be analyzed to assess the project's effectiveness. This analysis will involve identifying patterns, trends, and correlations in the data. The findings will be compiled into a comprehensive report that highlights the project's goals, outcomes, and recommendations for future improvements. The report will provide evidence-based insights into the impact of the project on student outcomes and teacher professional development.

Project Budget

Travel: \$900

The travel budget of \$900 can be used to cover expenses related to transportation, accommodation, and meals for country teachers and project staff who need to travel for face-to-face professional development sessions or cross-classroom observations. This will enable participants to attend these events and benefit from the learning and collaboration opportunities they provide.

Consultancy: \$1,200 Instructional Coaching

The budget for instructional coaching can be used to engage experienced consultants or experts who will provide one-on-one support and guidance to Chinese language teachers. They can assist teachers in implementing new teaching strategies and techniques aligned with the project's goals and objectives. The funds can cover the consultancy fees and any related expenses incurred during the coaching process.

Technology: \$900 Resource Library and Online Platform Development

The technology budget can be used to develop an online platform or website that hosts resource library, materials, and best practices for Chinese language teachers. This includes designing and developing the platform, covering hosting fees, and obtaining necessary technology tools or software licenses. It can also be allocated towards procuring or creating instructional resources tailored to the project's objectives.

Personnel: \$1,200

The personnel budget of \$1,200 can be allocated towards various activities involving personnel, such as:

Facilitators or trainers

It can be used to compensate professionals who lead the termly face-to-face professional development sessions, provide instructional coaching, or deliver consultancy services related to the project. This can include their expertise, time, and any associated expenses.

Project coordinators or administrators

It can be used to cover personnel costs associated with managing and coordinating the project, including administrative tasks, communication, and coordination among stakeholders.

Evaluation and Assessment: \$300

The budget for evaluation and assessment can cover the costs associated with collecting and analyzing data to evaluate the project's impact. This can include survey tools or software, data analysis software licenses, and any expenses related to data collection, such as printing survey forms or conducting interviews or focus groups.

Contingency Fund: \$500

The contingency fund is set aside to address unforeseen expenses or changes in project requirements. It provides flexibility to cover any unexpected costs that may arise during the project implementation, ensuring smooth progress and successful completion.














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
